Membership is based upon agencies meeting important community health and human-services needs, complying with ethical management and financial standards, annual reviews of agency operations by United Way Allocations volunteers, and other criteria as spelled out in their membership agreement with United Way.

United Way for Jackson & George Counties does recover the costs associated with pledge processing from donations in its annual fund-raising appeal. However, there is no fee charged to member agencies as a way of recovering those operating costs. These processing costs are not an additional cost beyond what is claimed in the IRS Form 990 as administrative and fund raising costs.

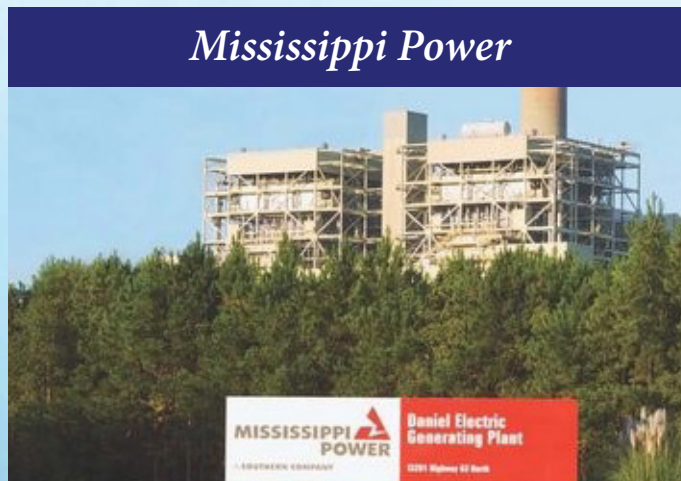





COMMUNITY RESOURCES CENTER

United Way's Community Resources Center bridges hope and community service for southeast Mississippi and helps connect people with the right human services agency to serve their needs through our Information and Referral program.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

United Way for Jackson & George Counties' Community Resources Center continued to serve our local communities in 2022. Families and individuals received direct financial assistance, relevant information, and appropriate referrals to area health and human services organizations.

COMMUNITY CARE COUNCIL

The Community Care Council brings together area nonprofit health and human services agencies to work towards community building and problem solving. The group meets at the United Way office throughout the year with different speakers and programs for each meeting. Attendees are encouraged to ask questions and offer ideas on how to better coordinate services being offered in Jackson and George counties.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Over the years, United Way for Jackson & George Counties has been fortunate to partner with many dynamic businesses and organizations in our area. One such group is Community Care Network (Sue's Home). Community Care Network is a faith based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization located in Ocean Springs. 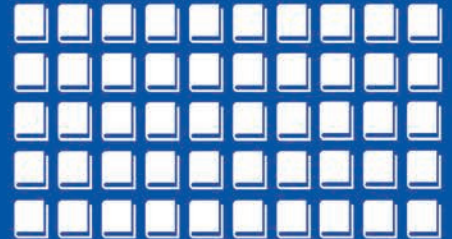

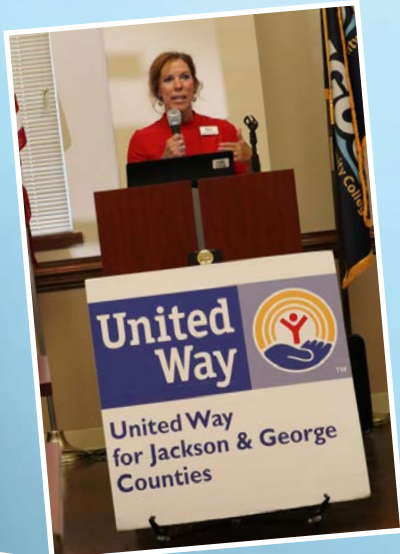
